There were a few hundred of us at the starting point at the Diocesan Centre, but the crowd soon grew to close to 500 in the course of the long six-kilometre walk, a four-and-one-half hour pilgrimage. My thanks to the directors of Pastorale Jeunesse, Father Michel Vallée and Mrs. Manon Ruest-Bourgoin, for having coordinated this activity. Thanks to the youth of the St.-Hilaire Correctional Centre for having made the cross which was taken in procession to the cathedral. Thank You to the Edmundston police and Agence Réact for their priceless collaboration. Thank You also to the community college, the regional hospital, Saint-Louis-Maillet University Centre, the Filles de Marie de l'Assomption Sisters, the pastoral teams of Notre-Dame-des-Sept-Douleurs, Notre-Dame-du-Sacré-Coeur, and the Cathedral parishes; to R.A.D.O.; to Sacré-Coeur School, the Villa Desjardins, Le Madawaska newspaper, the Canada Employment Centre, and the Anglican Church, for having participated in this great pilgrimage. After such a response on the part of the Edmundston population, one is certainly encouraged to think that next year another Way of Solidarity and Life will be held. From Edmundston-West to Edmundston-East? From St. Basil or St.-Jacques to Edmundston? Who knows? Maybe we should also consider going to the springs of running water on Easter Sunday, to get some Easter water!

EASTER

The Easter Vigil is the apex of liturgical life: what an impressive prayerful and hope-filled paschal vigil! My wish to the newly-baptised is for them to continue finding fervent, fraternal, and missionary Christian communities. After the period of preparation during Lent, after all the periods of community and inter-community renewal, it behooves us to experience the marvel that is Easter. Let us continue together our journey to Jesus: may the Risen One be our joy and our strength in good and difficult days alike.
