PRIESTS' ANNUAL RETREAT

The priests' annual retreat will be held at the Diocesan Centre from Monday, April 29 to Friday, May 3, under the direction of Sister Rita Gagné, an Ursuline nun from the Gaspé Diocese; this retreat will bear mainly on deepening the 1996-1997 liturgical themes. As with last year, the retreat this year will unfold in the greatest silence possible; except for major emergencies it is important at this time for the priests to abstain from all phone calls and visits. I invite all in the diocese, this week, to have a special intention in their prayers for the priests of our Church. Please not that from 4:0 P.M. Monday, April 29, until Friday, May 3, the Blessed Sacrament will be exposed in the bishop's quarters' chapel at the Diocesan Centre, and any who wish may share in this permanent adoration. At the Friday Fellowship Meal we shall be celebrating the priestly anniversaries of: Fr. Narcisse Gagnon (55), Fr. Rino Albert (50), Msgr. Fernand Boucher (50), Fr. Aurèle Godbout (40), Fr. Jean-Guy Lachance (40), Fr. Claude Michaud (40), Fr. Ernest Dumaresq (30), Fr. Alfred Irving (25), and Fr. Michel Bouffard (20). The priests' retreat is a special time of spiritual renewal for our priests, a time of prayer and priestly solidarity that only major reasons may dispense one from attending.

PRIESTLY ORDINATION

On Saturday, May 25, at St. Ann's of Maliseet, I shall have the joy of ordaining Leo Curtis Sappier to the priesthood. Curtis was born February 3, 1956, and is the son of Peter and Bertha Sappier of Maliseet. This occasion will mark the second time in my life that I preside a priestly ordination. According to information presently available, this will be the first time that a member of the Atlantic First Nations is ordained a priest. Curtis was the Maliseet school principal when he was first approached in 1990 with the suggestion that he study for the priesthood; constantly supported by the Maliseet community, Curtis discerned with his people

this call made to him by Bishop Gerard Dionne. He entered St. Paul Seminary in Ottawa in September, 1990; he was instituted lector June 16, 1991, and acolyte, August 23, 1992. He made his pastoral internship at the Aniashnabe Native Spirituality Centre, Holy Spirit Parish, Sturgeon Lake, Ontario (1993-1994), and at the Immaculate Conception Cathedral Parish, Edmundston (1994-1995). Iordained Curtis to the diaconate on July 26, 1995, and he returned to St. Paul Seminary in Ottawa last September to complete his studies for priestly ordination. Curtis has a broad life experience: his work among the native population has always been most appreciated. Curtis is a very soft-spoken and warm person, especially with the young and the sick. He shows much compassion for and understanding of others; with him, it is very much "people first." The Sappier family is very well known at Maliseet: Curtis is one of sixteen children, and he is godfather to eleven nephews and nieces. He is a good sportsman, especially in hockey. He is known for his wisdom and great spirit of faith. He is very interested in the culture of his people.. He has worked with book drug addicts and alcoholics. He has made great efforts to better understand the francophone language and culture. Let us keep him in our prayers.

FIRST EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS

It is in the Restigouche Deanery that the first diocesan Eucharistic Congress preparatory to the Jubilee Year 2000 will be help June 7, 8, and 9 of this year. It is exciting to see all the preparations in the works, in each of the deanery parishes: liturgy workshops, instructions on the person of Jesus Christ, guided tours of each church, workshops of the Eucharist (at St-Quentin) on May 18 and 19 with Fr. Jean-Yves Garneau, etc. I invite you to say the 1996 Congress prayer often: *Father, we acknowledge that your love is from age to age. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, your Son Jesus offered himself for us, and he continues to give himself to us in the sacrament of the Eucharist. As we approach the Jubilee Year 2000, help us keep the memorial of Jesus at the heart of our lives. May our Sunday gatherings be the source and summit of our Christian lives, as we recall the death and resurrection of Jesus and wait for his coming again in glory.
