Lord, I thank you for my parents Hormidas and Yvonne, for my brothers and sisters, for their families, and all my friends. Thank you for having allowed me to be born in Saint-Odilon on July 27, 1939, thank you for the grace of baptism, confirmation, and Holy Eucharist. Thank you for the six years of schooling I had in the rural school and the village school. Thank you for those years at the Externat Saint-Jean-Eudes and the Saint-Cœur-de-Marie Seminary in Québec City. Thank you for having called me to be a follower of Saint John Eudes, an evangeliser and formator of Gospel workers. Thank you for my priestly ordination celebrated in the Saint-Odilon parish church by Bishop Joseph-Aurèle Plourde, May 8, 1965. GIFT AND MYSTERY

Lord, I bless you for Bishop Gérard Dionne's fifty-seven years as a priest and thirty years as bishop. After serving as curate at Notre-Dame-des-Sept-Douleurs Parish, chaplain at the Marist Sisters' Mont Sainte-Marie Orphanage, and the Blessed Sacrament Sisters, as chaplain to the Religious Hospitallers of Saint Joseph in Saint-Basile, as director of the Office for Latin America at the Canadian Catholic [Bishops] Conference in Ottawa, and as pastor of Notre-Dame-des-Sept-Douleurs Parish in Edmundston, he generously accepted to be auxiliary bishop of Sault Sainte-Marie, in Ontario. He then became the fourth bishop of Edmundston. We praise you for all the work he accomplished, seeing himself as the brother of every human being, the brother of every baptised person and this, especially through the formation of the École de la Foi in Sudbury, Ontario and Edmundston, the Diocesan Synod, and the promotion of priestly, religious, and missionary vocations. Allow me to borrow the words of His Holiness Pope John Paul II from his book *Ma vocation don et mystère* ["My Vocation, Gift and Mystery"], which he published on the occasion of his fifty years as a priest: "To be an authentic guide to the community and a true steward of the mysteries of God, the priest is called to be a man of the Word of God, a generous and indefatigable evangeliser, before the immense tasks of the new evangelisation. This is a considerably demanding requirement, because people today expect the priest to live according to the Word, and not only to preach it. The priest must live from the Word."

Finally, Lord, allow me to repeat the words of Pope John Paul II, at the celebration marking his 25 years of pontificate, when he gave us the Exhortation *Pastores Gregis* on the bishop as a servant of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, for the hope of the world: "Relying on the word of God and holding firmly to hope, which like a sure and steadfast anchor reaches to the heavens, the Bishop stands in the midst of the Church as a vigilant sentinel, a courageous prophet, a credible witness and a faithful servant of Christ, our hope of glory."
